

While some companies' employees are toasting the holidays with Champagne and hors d'oeuvres, NVIDIA's employees forgo the party and instead take part in one of Silicon Valley's largest-ever annual employee volunteer service events, known as Project Inspire.

About 1,500 employees, their families, and other volunteers descended on the nonprofit Full Circle Farm in Sunnyvale one weekend in December, to saw wood, swing hammers, shovel dirt, paint, and more. The result was a huge boost to the farm's ability to provide nutrition education to students and fresh produce to the community.

"I think parties are kind of selfish and this is selfless," said Chris Pedersen, a content developer for NVIDIA, who was busy digging raised beds with his wife and two kids. "I think it's awesome; you always go home with a really good feeling."

The technology company started volunteer projects in lieu of a party in 2000. The events started with about 500 employees and other volunteers, but over the years have continued to grow. Marshaling that many people in a two-day service event

is no small feat; since 2009 the company has worked with City Year to organize the operations.

Every child has a birthday wish. But some children from poor or homeless families don't get those wishes fulfilled, which is why 8th grader Yasmine Davis decided to step in and make a difference.

Davis and her family are founders of the nonprofit Make a Birthday Wish, which provides presents and birthday parties for more than 300 disadvantaged children and teens in the Silicon Valley.

Along with her mom, Nike McDonald, Davis shops for presents for children and teenagers, then throws a party complete with decorations and cake for all the birthday boys and girls of one month. The children and teens are matched to Make a Birthday Wish through West Valley Community Services, head-quartered in Cupertino, CA.

"It helps me be more grateful for what I have, and not take for granted anything," Davis said of the parties she coordinates. "It's just a really great feeling to be with all the kids and see how appreciative they are for Make

a Birthday Wish."

Retired police officers Bob Froese and Jim Buchanan once looked upon the small low-income San Jose area of Alviso with hardened cops' eyes: a place with a few rough characters, and all the social ills that come with being a neighborhood of people living on the margins of society.

But after the two found themselves leading possibly one of the largest community service projects ever in Alviso, their hearts melted and they began to see the neighborhood with softer eyes.

"After our experience here we have a passion for the people of Alviso," Froese said. He said the stereotypes he once held for the community have completely disappeared.

With the precision of a major police operation, the two marshaled the forces of 600 volunteers one spring weekend for the "Awaken Alviso" project, one of 17 projects tackled by a San Jose coalition of churches, nonprofits, businesses and governmental agencies called Beautiful Day.

The two divided the neighborhood into zones and appointed block captains to coordinate work on 41 sites in the small community of 2,200 residents and nearly 500 homes.

"We planned it down to how many nails we'd need," he said.

San Jose pediatrician Daniel Delgado had a big problem.

His young patients – all from low-income families – were overweight or obese and in danger of developing diabetes. Many did not have access to the fresh fruits and vegetables vital for better nutrition.

How to connect his patients with the foods they so desperately need?

Delgado pinned his hopes that some of that need would be met through monthly visits from Second Harvest Food Bank's Produce Mobile to the East Valley Clinic of the Santa Clara County Valley Medical Center. The refrigerated truck is chock full of free, fresh produce reserved for qualified low-income families.

"It's the very first county clinic site where this type of collaboration is happening," Delgado said. "It's groundbreaking."

An estimated 200 families lined up to take advantage of the truck's bounty on the first visit, including Beatrice Romero and her 10-year-old son, Sanny. Romero came at the invitation of a doctor at the clinic.

"I think it's very good for my children and my money," Romero said. "It's a help."

Jean Wilder's broken heart over the death of a beloved cat is now overflowing with love for the almost 400 kittens she has fostered since 2001.

Wilder is a Kitten Foster Parent for Humane Society Silicon Valley (HSSV), saving the lives of young cats and socializing them in preparation for their new adopting families.

"It's so rewarding to see these little kitties develop and become social," she said. "It's probably the most fulfilling thing I've done, work-wise."

The 33-year Santa Clara resident used to be an analyst for Hewlett Packard, but now she considers it her job to make sure the kittens that stay temporarily in her home are ready to get along well with both people and other cats and become "nice family pets."

This new volunteer job is the legacy of a beloved cat named Gomer she owned more than 10 years ago.

When he died, she cried a lot of tears, but swept them away after she heard about kitten foster parenting at HSSV and soon greeted her first of many litters.

"I enjoy it so much," she said.

More than three decades ago, Donna Baranski-Walker took a stand to change the world by helping oppressed people in far-off Communist Poland. What she didn't know then was that changing the world would become the focus of her life.

From helping people living under Communist rule, to advocating for peace in times of war, to now helping rebuild communities torn apart by war, Baranski-Walker has always worked in one form or another for peace.

Her first efforts were recognized in August 2010, when she was awarded the Medal of Gratitude from the European Solidarity Committee in Poland, as the country celebrated the 30th anniversary of the creation of the Solidarity Movement.

Baranski-Walker was 25 and a newly graduated electrical engineer when she stood up at a university lecture in Chicago and proposed forming the group Support of Solidarity (SOS) – Chicago. The non-violent Solidarity Movement contributed to the collapse of Communism in Europe in 1989.

Now executive director of the group Rebuilding Alliance, a non-profit dedicated to rebuilding war-torn communities, Baranski-Walker has continued to work for peace and reconciliation throughout her life.

"I didn't realize when I was right out of college that this would become my life's work," she said.



# **New Life for Neighborhood**

With each deliberate stroke of their color-laden paintbrushes, volunteers brought new life to a beloved landmark in the Gardner Neighborhood of San Jose, and in the process, brought the possibility of new life to the neighborhood itself.

The landmark was a faded spray paint mural of an Aztec calendar on the back of an old cement handball court in Biebrach Park, created in 1995 by a young man who grew up there. Some in the neighborhood were feeling a bit faded themselves, after city budget cuts brought unwanted changes to the local community center.

The new Aztec calendar mural is now bursting with color, thanks to the work of more than 25 volunteers who worked through an annual spring service event in the Silicon Valley called Beautiful Day.

"I think this mural is going to bring a lot of peace to the neighborhood," said 18-year-old Jacob Palomares-Mason, who grew up in Gardner. "It's bringing this community together once more."

## **Bikes and Lives** epairing

"What goes around, comes around," is one western interpretation of Karma, and there's probably no better illustration of the concept than Good Karma Bikes of San Jose, where those who once sought free help for their broken down bicycles are now helping others—while repairing their own lives in the process.

Under the motto, "Transportation for transformation," the two-year-old nonprofit has grown from one laid off engineer fixing bikes for homeless people in St. James Park, to a team of volunteers that not only fix thousands of bikes each year for homeless and low-income clients, but also provide job training, as well as a friendly place to belong.

Every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Good Karma volunteers offer a free repair clinic to anyone who needs help with a broken bike. Nearly 50 people line up every week at the non-profit's headquarters at 345 Sunol St.

While it may look like Good Karma Bikes is one more non-profit providing free services to the community, founder and Executive Director Jim Gardner insists it's something more.

"This is not about bikes. What this is about mostly is self-esteem reparation," said Gardner.

### Sou **Body and** Warming

A small non-profit organization is warming the heart of East Palo Alto, CA., both figuratively and literally.

Project WeHOPE ("We Help Other People Excel") founded the struggling city's only warming shelter for homeless people in 2009. Every night from November to April, nearly 30 people on average come in from the cold for a hot meal, medical attention, and a warm place to sleep.

The shelter opened after it became apparent through a San Mateo County homeless census that East Palo Alto has the greatest percentage of homeless in the county.

"Very little was being done...no one was housing the homeless," said Pastor Paul Bains, President of WeHOPE and co-founder with his wife Cheryl. They did what only made sense to them: opened the shelter in the organization's gym, located in an industrial park warehouse.

Bains wasn't satisfied with just a place to come in from the cold. The shelter had to be, in his words, "not a hand out, but a hand up." Everyone looking for help was evaluated for their medical and mental needs, and given help with connecting to longer-term transitional housing.

"We help them to restore their dignity," Bains said.

grew into one of the largest, most creative computer-automated—and solar powered—local holiday displays in the Silicon Valley. It was so big it covered the house, roof and yard of Severns home, and the house and yard of his next-door neighbors, the Pease family.

With "snow" blowing from where an automated Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer sat perched on top of Severns' garage, to cute joking elves, to the 88,000 lights choreographed to rousing music, the display was extremely popular with both kids and adults alike.

Severns put out collection barrels for Second Harvest Food Bank of Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties, and a secured box to collect money. The first year they raised \$8,000 in a combined total of food and money.

"Every year since we've done better than the previous year, even in the economic downturn, which really surprised me," he said. In 2010 Severns gathered a record \$84,000.
